

Historical Perspectives

Aloha! As our theme for the Hui this year is “Military Spouses Make History Happen,” it is very fitting for us to take some time to focus on the history of the spouse and highlight some of the amazing contributions military spouses have made throughout the years. Those who are military spouses know a life of sacrifice and adventure. Historically, military wives occupied many different roles, including patriot, helpmate, lover, comforter, confidant, and pioneer (Alt & Stone, 1991). Do these roles sound familiar?

“Today, more than ever, the military wife is a pioneer who travels to strange lands, rears her family under nomadic and often inhospitable conditions, and, many times copes with the stress of surviving on her own” (Alt & Stone, 1991, p. xi). Strange lands? Nomadic conditions? Surviving on your own? These are common threads that bind military spouses together throughout the ages and will continue to weave our stories together in the future. The wives and families who joined their husbands during the winter of 1777 at Valley Forge set a precedent for future wives and military families to be “camp followers” and to become an integral part of our military even today. These brave wives, who followed their husbands westward after the Revolutionary War, continued their journey and “established the tradition of the self-sacrificing military wife” (Alt & Stone, 1991, p. 31).





SECRET SPOTS OF OAHU



Beach Access #276 C, known as Ke Iki Beach, is a beautiful white sand beach on Oahu's North Shore. It is accessible off Ke Iki Road, a residential road running parallel to the Kam Highway. The beach features nearly a mile of soft white sand with a rocky reef at the west end.

Its relative seclusion draws smaller crowds than the nearby Sunset and Pipeline Beaches, but there is limited parking in the residential area, so either arrive early or be prepared for a short walk. To access the beach, you will need to go down a short path lined with trees.

In the summer (which roughly corresponds from May to September here in Hawaii), the water is usually calm, making it safe for swimming and snorkeling. However, it's the "winter season" (October through April) which means BIG waves on the North Shore so, unless you're an expert, avoid the water as the waves can reach 20 feet. Instead, Ke Iki Beach is a wonderful place to relax, sunbathe, watch sunsets or search for sea glass and shells, especially after a storm. The location is also known as an excellent spot for whale watching during winter and as one of the few dog-friendly beaches in the area.

There are no facilities on-site, and shade is limited so plan accordingly by bringing water, food, umbrella, sunblock, etc. You can also pick up any last-minute supplies or snacks from nearby stores and small eateries.



The Life She was Given. Ellen Marie Wiseman. Kensington Books, 2017, 304 pgs. **ISBN-13:** 978-1617734496

Wiseman's poignant, lyrical language and vivid descriptions weave together the lives of two women from different decades with a Depression-era traveling circus, child abandonment, family secrets, complicated mother-daughter relationships, and somehow, glimmers of hope. If the beautiful language doesn't reel you in, the skinny-dipping with elephants and look behind the scenes of circus sideshow acts will...

OLDIE BUT GOODIE:

The Bell Jar. Sylvia Plath. Harper Perennial Modern Classics, 1963, 288 pgs. **ISBN-13:** 978-0060837020

The Bell Jar is a semi-autobiographical novel chronicling Esther Greenwood's descent into insanity through an intense first-person narrative. As an ambitious, compulsive overachiever yet neurotic writer, Esther struggles with her identity and the oppressive societal norms for 1950's women. The detailed, angry, and raw descriptions of Esther's journey and the limited, contemporary choices for her gender made Plath's novel an early voice of the women's movement and gender conflicts, as well as mental health issues.

BEACH READ:

Rich People Problems. Kevin Kwan. Doubleday, 2017, 416 pgs. **ISBN-13:** 978-0385542234

The third book in Kwan's satirical and campy Rich trilogy (following 2013's *Crazy Rich Asians* and 2015's *China Rich Girlfriend*), but the portrayal of the outrageous antics of its uber-rich characters is funny enough to stand on its own. A dying matriarch leads to a series of hysterical, laugh-out-loud moments filled with family drama, sabotage, amends, sex tapes, and plastic surgery for pet fish with drooping eyes.

ARE YOU PREPARED FOR A HURRICANE?

(THE STORM, NOT THE DRINK)

It is currently the middle of hurricane season here in Hawaii. Though landfall of a hurricane on the island is rare, it does happen. Even if it doesn't make landfall, it can still create problems. **Be Prepared!** The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) recommends you and your family prepare a basic disaster supply kit and have it available throughout the hurricane season...

The following are some recommended items to put in your kit:

- Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation
- Food, at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food
- Battery-powered or hand crank radio and a NOAA Weather Radio with tone alert and extra batteries for both
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle to signal for help
- Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation
- Wrench or pliers to turn off utilities
- Manual can opener for food
- Prescription medications and glasses
- Infant formula and Diapers
- Pet food and extra water for your pet
- Cash or traveler's checks and change (no electricity = no ATMs)

Reservations Policy 2017-2018

Deadline: The deadline this year will be posted on the Evite. It is 10-14 days BEFORE the luncheon. Please be aware of the date listed on your Evite!

If you are a member and are bringing a guest, you must RSVP for your guest as well as yourself. If your guest is not able to attend after the deadline. You are still responsible for the cost of your guest.

Guest: Guest may only attend one luncheon or become a member if planning to attend more than one luncheon.

Payment: The Hui will accept cash (\$20) and credit using the Square (\$21) at the luncheons. There is NO ATM at the Leilehua Golf Course.

Cancellations: To cancel a reservation, please change your response in your Evite. After the deadline, you cannot cancel your reservation, and you will still be charged the \$20 for the luncheon. The Hui's logo resembles a quilt pattern and incorporates many aspects of the origins of the 25th Infantry Division in Hawaii. At each corner is a taro leaf, representing the birthplace of the Division as well as the foundation of Hawaiian life: family, or `ohana. The lightning bolt within the taro leaves signify the lightning conquests the Division won throughout the Pacific during World War II. The Division patch, comprised of the taro leaf and the lightning bolt, faces out in the four cardinal directions and symbolizes the missions and deployments by the Division today, performed all over the world.

The Pineapple, the universal symbol of hospitality and Aloha, is included between the taro leaves as a reminder of the enduring friendship between the Army and the Hawaiian people. At the center of the pattern is an eight-spoke cogged wheel that represents the U.S. Army, Hawaii's eight major subordinate commands. The spokes surround the hub which is the U.S. Army Hawaii's "H" patch, symbolic of all-encompassing support rendered the Division. It is also the core of our Army community, the foundation of our family support and includes our indispensable Army civilians.

The entire design is surrounded by eight waves, symbolic of our island home. Reverence and respect for the ocean have been part of the Hawaii society dating back to ancient Polynesian voyagers. The eight waves tie together the eight islands that complete the state of Hawaii, just as they tie the 25th Infantry Division and the U.S. Army Hawaii to the Hawaiian people.

This exclusive quilt design has been reproduced in wood engravings, glass products, clothing and a variety of other items that are for sale by the Hui `O Na Wahine. We've had the logo printed, stitched, and etched on many different items, including golf shirts, T-Shirts, aprons, crystal, mugs, tote bags and more. We carry seasonal logo items too.

Hui logo items are available for purchase at monthly Hui luncheons and the Thrift Store. Proceeds from the sale of Hui logo items are dispersed into the community through our Scholarships and Welfare Grants.
